Dear Friends,

Alleluia, Christ is Risen!!!

I take this opportunity to wish you and your family a Happy Easter! May the Peace and Joy of the Risen Lord be with you all!

On the first Easter morning the message is “you came back.” Let us remember that no one expected what the disciples experienced on Easter morning. The disciples never understood fully the teaching about resurrection. They did not expect Easter!

But from the beginning God made it clear that he was in the business of life and not death. God works to give and promote life. Every time we thought everything was lost, God comes back. God always comes back to give us life. God is in the resurrection business. God has been from the beginning...So how could the tomb be other than empty?

Easter is not a history but the mystery we share. In our personal life when we felt God has given us up... beaten down by death, fear, powerlessness, sickness, loss, abandonment and grief... God comes back.

For me, the important question is not so much “Do I believe that God raised up Jesus 2,000 years ago?” but rather, “Do I believe that God can raise up someone like you and me?” The existential question is not so much whether God empowered Jesus to come forth from the dark place of death, but whether you and I can believe that God can empower us to come forth from our dark place of pain, sin and suffering. Hopefully, our answer is a resounding “Yes!” If so, we have Easter faith. Let us place our hand in God’s hand and trust that God can raise us from our dead places just as Jesus was raised to new life.

He is risen alleluia.... We are an Easter people and we need to be in the business of life. It could be by being patient and forgiving; more generous and honest; a deeper prayer life and a gentle tongue; feeding the hungry, helping the poor and visiting the sick; working for justice and defense of human life; following a different career and a decision to volunteer; the daily task of parenting, spousing or befriending and paying attention to the responsibility that is placed in our hands.

Our invitation today is to be partners with God in the business of life and resurrection. We are an Easter people, and Alleluia is our song.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Easter is nearly three weeks later this year than last. Why does the date wobble around the calendar so? The way of calculating the date was set by the Emperor Constantine in 325. The decision ended a very bitter controversy in the church. Some people wanted to synchronize the Pasch with Passover on the fourteenth day of the Jewish month Nissan, and their opponents wanted it after the Passover was complete, on the Sunday after the first full moon of springtime. The ecclesiastical rules do not exactly connect with the astronomical rules. The emperor squashed the hopes of the quartodecimans, as the fans of 14 Nissan were called, and chose Sunday. The traditional rule is that Easter is the first Sunday after the first ecclesiastical full moon that occurs on or after the vernal equinox, the fourteenth day of the new moon, and later than March 21. Thus, Easter wobbles between March 22 and April 25.

The actual tables and methods for computing the date are extraordinarily detailed, with subtle variations and mind-bending exceptions and charts with “golden numbers,” “dominical letters,” and “epacts” measuring leap years. In 1954 and 1962 the ecclesiastical calculations actually overrode the astronomical new moons and bumped Easter back a month! Today, there is a movement in the World Council of Churches (Protestants and Orthodox) for all Christians to combine their celebrations, based on the star charts for the Jerusalem skies. In principle, the Catholic Church is open to an ecumenical agreement on a fixed date for Easter, but we desire a unanimous decision from the World Council.

Excerpts from a letter from Bishop Michael C. Barber to the Priests of the Diocese of Oakland dated March 28, 2017, regarding diocesan action on immigration:

“When I was a stranger, you welcomed me.” (Matthew 25:35) ...The Church is the Body of Christ. So when one part of the Church suffers, all the other parts suffer with it. This is the case in our diocese today, with the prospect of children coming home from school and finding one or both of their parents missing because they have been deported.

I want to be up front that I, and all Catholic bishops in the USA, believe every nation has the right to establish and control its borders. We also believe that criminals: drug dealers, human traffickers, thieves, etc. should be arrested, prosecuted, and — if need be — deported. No one disputes that.

...The number one issue all Catholic bishops and I favor is Comprehensive Immigration Reform. ... America is a country of immigrants. We are a Church of immigrants. Our Catholic Faith teaches that we should welcome the stranger, the immigrant, the widow, and the orphan. ... Even more, in the Catholic Church, all the baptized are not only equal “members”, but are brothers and sisters in Christ. ...

Here is what we are doing as a Church to follow God’s express command to help:

1. Representatives of the US Bishop’s Conference are meeting with leaders of our government in Washington to intercede for our immigrant community, asking that parents not be separated from each other or from their children.
2. Archbishop Cordileone and I are meeting in early April with the head of ICE (U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement) in the Bay Area to intercede for our own local communities.
3. I ask all pastors and principals of Catholic parishes and schools not to allow agents from ICE to enter our church and school properties without proper legal warrants. If needed, please contact Cristina Hernandez at the chancery for immediate assistance at chernandez@oakdiocese.org or by phone at 510-267-8379.
4. We will continue to provide service to those who seek assistance, such as food, shelter and legal aid, through our related organizations, such as Catholic Charities, regardless of the person’s national origin, religion or immigration status. Contact Catholic Charities of the East Bay, and St. Vincent de Paul chapters for assistance.
5. The diocese is organizing Training Sessions and Workshops in every region and deanery so people may know their rights and protections under the law. I ask pastors to publicize these workshops to the greatest extent possible. There are many community and legal resources for our people that are just a phone call away. “Knowing your rights”, and “What to do if ICE should come knocking”, is one of the greatest assets to reduce the level of fear and anxiety in our people. You can access this information at www.oakdiocese.org/immigration.
6. The Diocese of Oakland supports the dignity of all persons without regard to immigration status. The Church asks the congress and president to pass Comprehensive Immigration Reform. Until that happens, the Church stands in solidarity with those who are currently living “in the shadows”.

I realize people of good will may have differing opinions on immigration. But if you are a Christian and consider yourself a disciple of Christ, I ask you to please consider the situation from Christ’s point of view. We do not demonize those with whom we disagree. We are Americans, yes. But Christians, first. Remember what happened when Joseph was commanded by the angel to get up in the middle of the night, take Mary and the Child, and flee to Egypt. Would you have deported them from Egypt, because they did not have papers? Deported them back into Herod’s hands?

I take this opportunity to thank each one of you for your faithful ministry to all our brothers and sisters, especially those in the peripheries. May the Lord bless you and reward you.
