

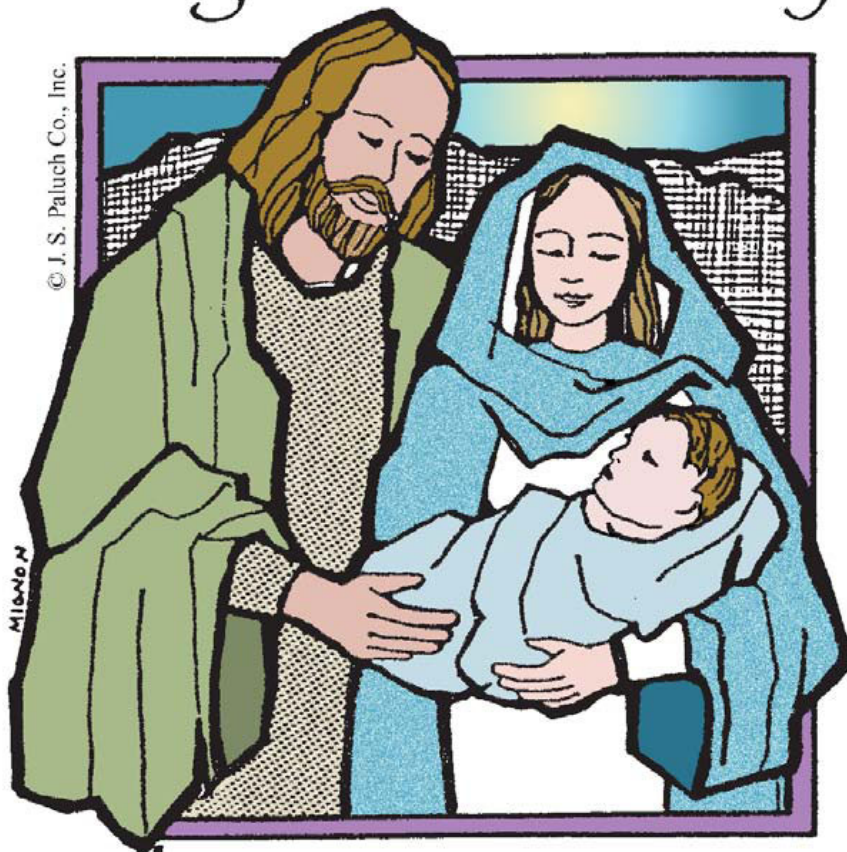

Reflections on the Holy Family – from a family which tries to be holy, but seldom makes it.

I have always related to the Holy Family (Joseph, Mary, and the child Jesus), especially to Mary. I think women frequently pray to Mary, because as a mother, we feel certain that she shared some of our same anxieties – particularly worries about our children.

In today's gospel reading, Mary and Joseph are frantic about their missing 12-year-old son. They assumed he was with friends and family on their return trek from Jerusalem to Nazareth, only to realize he was missing. What mother hasn't gone into panic mode after just a few minutes when her child has wandered off in the store or at a park. When you find them, you don't know whether to hug them or reprimand them. You can relate to how Mary and Joseph must have felt.

I got a late start at motherhood – through circumstances, not planning. As a child, I always envisioned having a devoted spouse and 21 beautiful children (not very realistic, but imaginative). I imagine that Mary had similar dreams as a young girl and that things turned out a bit differently than she anticipated. My first son was born one week before Christmas, and I remember spending Christmas Day that year crying for poor Mary who had her baby in a stable, instead of a hospital, and who didn't have wet wipes or a diaper service. (Yes, I was a bit hormonal.) But she had Joseph to take care of them, and I imagine she trusted him, like I trusted my husband would watch out for us. And we all had God watching over us, and we all trusted Him.

Throughout the years Mary and Joseph would have been the primary examples for Jesus to follow and give Him his moral bearing during His formative years. I was very blessed in that I was able to stay home with my children when they were young, to show them how to behave, and to share my values and faith. We were able to send them to Catholic schools to further strengthen the foundation of their morals and religion. As parents, we have always chosen to be active in our children's activities, helping with team sports and being leaders in Scouting. As adolescents and teenagers, my boys spent many weekends camping with my husband, enjoying nature, and learning how to take care of the environment. I imagine Joseph spent a lot of time with Jesus, too, teaching him how to be a carpenter, probably taking him fishing, and sharing stories of His heritage.

Our children are now young adults, and the anxieties are still there. When our children have illnesses, we worry about them. We worry about paying for college. We worry that they won't find good jobs. We worry about the climate, violence, and the unstable political situations in the world. Things we once ignored or took for granted – we started worrying about once we had children.

And I worry about their faith. They are on their own spiritual journey now. It's time to let go of them, trust in the seeds we have sown, and let the Spirit continue to lead them on their faith journey. I can't even begin to imagine what Mary went through at the time Jesus started His ministry. He was going against the leaders of his church (synagogue). Why couldn't he be a good Jewish boy and start His own family, make her a grandmother? But she trusted God – and so must we.

FAMILY LIFE

And parents everywhere (children, too) can probably relate to—and take some solace in—the Gospel's account of Mary and Joseph after Jesus explained why he stayed behind in the temple. They heard his words, Luke tells us, "But they did not understand what he said to them" (Luke 2:50). Amen! Nevertheless, Jesus does go back home with them, and continues to thrive under their care.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This New Year's Eve, at the turning of the year, you may catch a glimpse of the old year, a cartoon figure of a hunched old man with a sickle, Father Time. Where else but in this column could you learn that this is in fact a pope? December 31 was in the old calendar the feast of St. Sylvester. Legend says that Sylvester healed the Emperor Constantine of leprosy, and presided at the liturgy of baptism for the grateful emperor. In 314, he was chosen pope, and it fell to him to organize the peacetime church, free at last from persecution. He founded the Lateran Basilica, the cathedral of the Diocese of Rome.

In northern Europe "Sylvester Night" is a time of great parties with eating, dancing, and singing—recalling perhaps the joy of the church in the fresh air of Sylvester's papacy. In Poland, there was great fear as the year 1000 approached that an immense dragon would devour the earth and set fire to the heavens. The people prayed earnestly to St. Sylvester, trusting that the saint would not permit such suffering on his feast day. They've been celebrating ever since!

Many New Year's customs have pagan roots, like the British "First Footer" tradition. The idea is that the first person setting foot into your house in the new year determines the luck for the year ahead. The ideal first footer was not a bit like old Pope Sylvester, but rather a tall, dark-haired man carrying the right gift. A handsome first footer meant the year ahead would be pleasant, and if he carried bread or a shovel of coal there would be food and warmth in the future. Who will be your household's first footer?

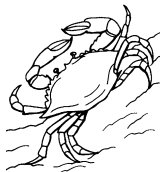

HEALING THE HEART GRIEF WORKSHOP

If you or someone you know is grieving the death of a loved one, you are invited to attend our **Healing the Heart** workshop. **We offer a safe place to express grief and begin healing after the loss of a loved one.** Our grief ministers have also lost someone who is dear to them and know the value of having someone listen with their heart. They recognize that each person's grief is unique.

The death of a loved one is unlike any other loss. Whether the death was sudden and tragic, or one with warning and preparation, the reality of death leaves most of us shocked, confused and sad. These feelings may linger for years.

The grief workshop is a six week program characterized by trust in prayer, open sharing and spirituality. It is a Christ-centered program, but you do not have to be a member of St. Bonaventure's parish or a Catholic to attend. It is open to anyone who has experienced the loss of a loved one. The loss may have been a recent one or a long time ago.
